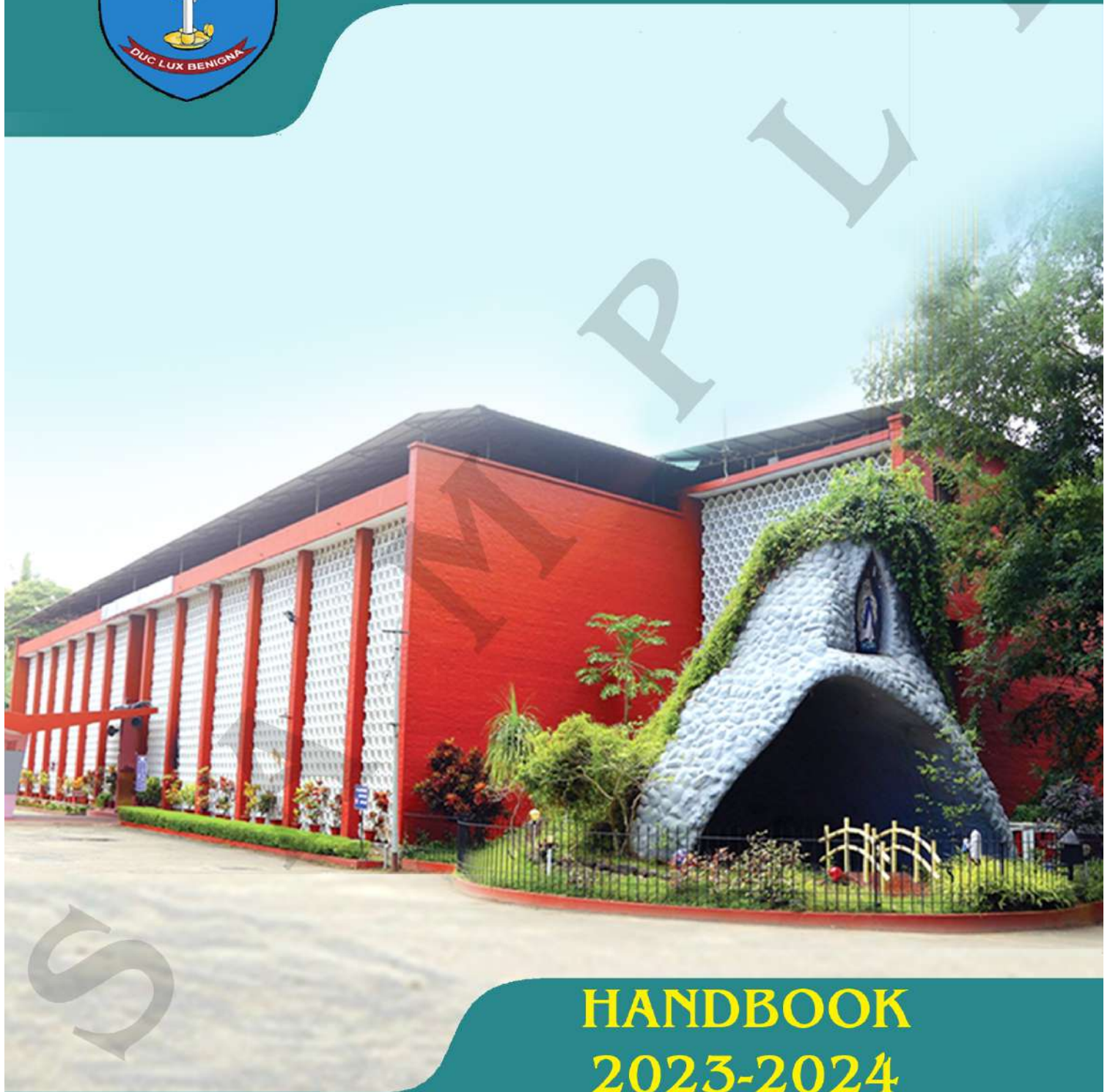
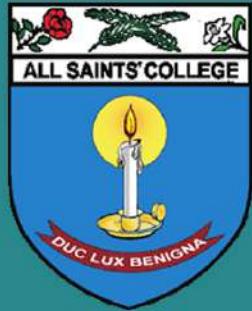

Our Inspiration

Our Foundress, Venerable Mother Mary Veronica of the Passion née Sophie Leeves was an Anglican by birth, a Catholic by conviction and a religious by choice. Her father, Rev. Daniel Leeves, an Anglican pastor had an edifying influence on his family and impressed upon his children the virtues of piety, charity, search for truth and knowledge. Sophie Leeves grew up cultured and highly accomplished. Knowledge of Greek and music were part of her education.

Sophie's questioning mind and her straightforward nature made her examine the tenets of her Faith and slowly she found herself drawn to Catholic doctrines, to the Blessed Mother, the Saints and the Sacraments. Her search for the True Faith led her to Catholicism and her resolve to live a life close to Christ, saw her enter the Convent of the Sisters of St. Joseph of the Apparition in 1850. As a young, fervent religious she was filled with a passion to suffer for Christ and work with zeal and commitment. She was assigned to teach and care for the sick. Sr. Veronica was indispensable from the start at Athens, later Rome, and Tremorain France.

In 1862, Sr. Veronica landed on the coast of Malabar to set up a new foundation in Calicut. St. Joseph's Convent was opened and she was appointed Superior. India was a turning point in her life. It was here that she first heard her interior voice calling her to Carmel. She met Bishop Marie Ephrem who facilitated her entry into Carmel who envisioned the foundation of the Third Order Apostolic of Our Lady of Mount Carmel. She drew up the constitution for the Third Order.

In 1868, after many hurdles, the Order was established at Bayonne to nurture and educate sisters for the mission in India. In 1870, the first batch of Carmelites left for India and the Apostolic Carmel Congregation was established in Mangalore where the young, trained sisters committed themselves with zeal and fervour to build up the Congregation. Mother Veronica returned to the Carmel of Pau.

It was through her selfless sacrifice and efforts that generations of young girls in India received the light of knowledge and still continue to do so. She guided her nascent Congregation from Carmel at Pau where she spent her last days as a saintly cloistered nun. The end came on November 16, 1906. Mother Veronica had fought the good fight, finished the race and kept the faith. Her legacy is kept alive through her daughters who continue to empower women through education.

OUR HISTORY

- 1964 : All Saints' College is founded by Rev. Mother Mary Louise, CCR with the approbation of the Rt. Rev. Dr. V .V. Dereere,OCD, Bishop of Trivandrum. The College begins functioning in the Holy Angels' premises on 6 July 1964 with Miss Margaret P. Paulose as Principal and 277 students in the First Year Pre-Degree class.
- 1965 : On 15 May His Excellency the Most Rev. James R. Knox, Apostolic Internuncio to India lays the foundation stone of the first block of the College at Chackai, the permanent campus.
- 1967 : The College is shifted to the new campus at Chackai on 10 January. It is upgraded on 24 July with the introduction of Degree Courses in English, History, Economics, Mathematics, Chemistry and Zoology.
- 1980 : B.Sc. Botany and B.Com Degree Courses are offered for the first time in July.
- 1982 : The College receives sanction to commence the postgraduate course in English Language and Literature.
- 1993 : The first batch of B.Sc. Physics students begins the course.
- 1995 : M.Com. is the second postgraduate course to be introduced in College.
- 1999 : The B.A. (Restructured) Course in Communicative English is introduced. The postgraduate course in M.Sc. Environmental Sciences commences as a multi disciplinary course.
- 2001 : The College is accredited by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) in July.
- 2008 : The College is reaccredited by NAAC with grade B (2.81) in March.

- 2011 : The College is selected as a centre for the Kerala State IT Mission (KSITM) programme, “Skill Enhancement Computer Training and Women’s Re-source Centre in Colleges of Kerala” in January. The postgraduate course in M. Sc Environmental Sciences –which was initially a self-financing course—is regularized with the approval of the Government of Kerala. The Postgraduate Department of Environmental Sciences is constituted as a separate Department from 11 October.
- 2012 : All Saints’ College is one of the three colleges in Kerala under the Star College Scheme. This is a scheme initiated by the Department of Biotechnology (DBT) under the Ministry of Science and Technology, Government of India to nurture excellence in undergraduate Science.
- 2013 : The College celebrates its Golden Jubilee marking 50 years of academic excellence and service.
- 2014 : The B.Com (Travel & Tourism) Course is introduced. The College is recognised as an IGNOU Study Centre (Code: 40028) in January. The centre offers degree courses in Social Work (BSW), Commerce (B.Com) as well as postgraduate courses in English (MEG), Economics (MEC), Commerce (M.Com), History (MAH), Social Work (MSW), Women and Gender Studies (MAWGS). A one-month course in Computer Literacy (CLP) is also offered. The inauguration of the Golden Jubilee Celebrations was held on 7 September by the Hon. Chief Minister Shri Oommen Chandy.
- 2015 : The Valedictory function of celebrations marking the Golden Jubilee year was held on 30 October and was presided over by Hon. Governor Justice (Retd.) P. Sathasivam.
- 2016 : The college is reaccredited by NAAC with grade A (3.01).
- 2019 : Department of Environmental Sciences became a research centre.
- 2021 : MSc.Physics (With specialization in Space Physics)
- 2022 : The College is reaccredited by NAAC with grade A+ (3.38)

WORKING DAYS & CLASS TIMINGS

The class timing of the college is from 9.30 a.m. to 3.30 p.m. The morning session begins with the College Prayer. At the warning bell, students should go promptly to their classes for the prayer. The college office is open from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on all days except second Saturdays and public holidays.

RULES FOR STUDENTS

Students should strictly follow the rules of the College. It is the duty of every student to abide by the rules and regulations of the College and conduct herself with decency and decorum. Violation of the rules will result in disciplinary action.

Identity Cards and Tags: College identity tags should be worn compulsorily in the campus. All payments, issue of certificates, mark list etc. will be made only on production of the Identity Card. The Identity Card shall be surrendered to the office at the time of claiming there fund of caution deposit or issuing of transfer certificate whichever earlier.

Mobile Phones: The use of mobile phones is strictly prohibited inside the college campus during class hours.

Cyber Ethics: Students must not post derogatory or unfavourable comments against the college, teachers or other students on online platforms such as Facebook, Instagram or any other social media. Doing so is punishable as per the Indian Penal Code. Strict action will be taken by the college against students who are found guilty of this offense.

Ragging-A serious criminal offence:

Ragging is a cognizable offence and is banned in the institution. Complaints regarding ragging should be lodged with the Anti-Ragging Cell. Stern action will be taken against those found guilty of participating in or abetting ragging. Action taken will depend on the nature and gravity of the offence:

- ◆ Suspension from classes
- ◆ Debarring from examination
- ◆ Expulsion from the college

No leniency will be shown in this regard. Those found guilty are also liable to be punished by the Court of Law and can be sentenced to rigorous imprisonment up to 3 years.

Every student has to submit a duly filled and signed undertaking against ragging to the anti-ragging cell.

Political Activities are banned: Political Activity is strictly banned in the college as per the Honorable High Court. Students must not
(i) circulate any note or paste it anywhere in the college
(ii) collect money or (iii) organize any meeting without the permission of the Principal.

CHARACTER AND CONDUCT

1. Students should come to College on time, neatly and modestly dressed.
2. During Assembly all members of the staff and students are expected to observe silence till the National Anthem is over.
3. Exemplary behaviour is expected from all the students both on and off campus. Students must behave in a manner fitting the principles and ethics of the college.
4. Students must keep the college clean and tidy. They have to compensate for any loss to college property.

OTHER RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. College notice boards should be consulted daily.
2. Bus cards must be brought every day. The cards are to be returned on or before the closing date.
3. Students are not permitted to leave the campus during class hours.

4. Students are not permitted to have visitors in College.
5. Free hours must be spent in the library.
6. Unauthorized collection of funds by students is not permitted. No money should be collected without the sanction of the Principal.
7. Prior written permissions of the Principal is necessary for organizing meetings, entertainment programmes, functions in the college; for collecting funds from the students/staff and for distributing notice or putting up any notice on the notice board.
8. Students shall not write or make any marks on the walls or any part of the college property. If found guilty, they are liable to be punished and the expenses for the repair work will be recovered from the offenders.
9. Students are not allowed to receive food or parcel deliveries in college. Official letters if any, will be received in the office.
10. Photography in and around the railwaygate and tracks are strictly prohibited. Stern action will be taken against those found guilty of breaking the rule.

ATTENDANCE

- ◆ Students should be regular and punctual in attending the classes. Attendance will be marked at the beginning of each hour by the teacher engaging the class.
- ◆ If one teaching hour is missed it is equal to missing half a day's attendance.
- ◆ Students who do not have at least 73% of attendance are not eligible to appear for university examinations.
- ◆ A student abstaining from classes without proper acknowledgement of leave for more than three consecutive working days will have to report to the college with her parent/guardian.

- ♦ Applying for leave of absence does not imply that the leave will be granted.
- ♦ The percentage of attendance shall be calculated course-wise. To determine the eligibility for registration for the ESE (End Semester Examination), the average of the course-wise percentage of attendance will be considered. Benefits of attendance may be granted to students who attend University Union Activities, meetings of University Bodies and participate in extra-curricular activities by treating them present for the days of their absence for the above purpose on the production of a participation/attendance certificate in such activities issued by the University authorities/Principals, subject to a maximum of ten days in a semester.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE

1. A student requiring leave for an hour from the class must apply for it to the teacher concerned before the period begins.
2. A student requiring leave for a whole session or more must apply for it in writing to the Principal through the class teacher.
3. The application for leave should contain the following:
 - i Name
 - ii Residential Address
 - iii Class, Main and Roll No.
 - iv No.of days of leave required with dates
 - v Reason for leave
 - vi Signature of the student with date
 - vii Counter signature of parent/guardian/warden
 - viii Counter signature of the class teacher with date
 - ix Application for medical leave should be applied for with a proper medical certificate attached.

FEE REGULATION

As per G.O. M.S. No.9574/H. Edn. dated 12 June 1974, tuition fees will be collected in eight equal installments in the months of June, August, September, October, November, January and February respectively.

The first installment of tuition fees, special fees and deposit will be collected from the students of senior classes with in a period of seven consecutive working days beginning from the date of re-opening of the College. In the case of students of junior classes, the first installment of tuition fees due till the date of admission with special fees and caution deposit will be collected on the date of admission. Subsequent installments will be collected on or before the 7th consecutive working day of the month concerned.

1. It shall be open to students to remit the tuition fees as a lumpsum at the beginning of the academic year.
2. If any student fails to pay the tuition and/or special fees on the due date, she shall be liable to pay a fine of Rs.5/- along with the fees or Special Fees on or before the 10th day after the due date. If the 10th day happens to be a holiday, the next working day will be counted as the 10th day.
3. If the tuition fee and /or special fee with the fine of Rs. 5/- is not paid on or before the last date fixed for it, a fine of Rs. 15/- will have to be paid. If the fees and fine of an installment are not paid before the last opportunity given for payment of that installment, the name of the student will be removed from the rolls of the College with effect from the date following the expiry of that period and the student will not get the benefit of attendance also from the date of removal from the rolls of the College. If and when the amount due is paid and the student is readmitted, she will get the benefit of attendance from the date of re-admission.
4. The last opportunity for payment of an installment of fees will be the last working day before the due date of the

succeeding installment. But in the case of the fees due for February, the last date fixed is 5th March. If 5th March happens to be a holiday, then the last working day previous to such a date will be considered as the last date. If a student does not pay the dues till the last date prescribed, she will not be allowed to appear for the university examination.

5. Fees will be collected at the college office counter from 9 a.m. to 2.30 p.m. on working days.

CAUTION DEPOSIT

1. As per G.O.M.S.No.58/75/H. Edn. Trivandrum dated April 1975, every student on admission shall along with the first installment of fees pay the caution deposit prescribed for each course. At the end of the course of study the caution deposit will be refunded on receipt of application from the student in the prescribed form available from the college office, after adjusting all dues, if any. All claims for refund of caution deposit shall be made before the re-opening date of the next academic year in which the course is completed.
2. Students should keep the receipt issued for remittance of the caution deposit in safe custody. The deposit shall be ordinarily refunded only if the receipt is produced along with the application for refund. Failure to produce the original receipt can result in forfeiture of the claim for refund.

EDUCATIONAL CONCESSIONS

1. Fee concession and stipend will be given to candidates whose parents produce the certificate of registration, showing thereby that they belong to the fishermen community. However, they have to pay the caution deposit at the time of enrolment.
2. Students belonging to the other backward communities, socially and educationally backward classes and forward communities under the Kumara Pillai Commission Report, are eligible for fee concession. They have to (a) pay the

caution deposit at the time of enrolment (b) produce an income certificate from the Village Officer, in the revised form. The income limit of the parents, guardians prescribed for the award of educational concessions to the OBC, SEBC students under going the Degree Course and PG course is below 6 lakhs per annum. The income of the guardians will be considered only if the parents are no longer living.

3. Students belonging to scheduled castes, scheduled tribes and converts from these are exempted from paying the fees and caution deposit.
4. Students eligible for full concession (SC/ST), OBC, OEC and children of Registered Fishermen should submit their application to the Principal in the prescribed form available in the college office within 15 days of their admission to the college.

Students' Fund

The Students' Fund is the life line of many of our under privileged students. Aid is granted by way of relief in fees, State Merit Scholarship (SMS) financing, books, clothes and writing materials. There sponsibility for disbursement of this fund rests with the Principal and the Management. Applications to avail of this fund must reach the Principal by 31st August.

Students' Aid Fund

The University of Kerala provides a Students' Aid Fund for which the application must reach thePrincipal by 31st August.

ISSUE OF CERTIFICATES

Students requiring certificates of transfer, conduct and character, course, marks, bonafide should submit an application to the Principal and state their name, year of study, register number and course of study. Ordinarily a notice of 24 hours is required for the issuance of a certificate.

ADMINISTRATIVE BODIES

College Council

This is a statutory body that advises and assists the Principal in all academic and administrative matters. The Council consists of the Heads of Departments, elected representatives from the teaching staff, a representative of the Management and the Principal who acts as the Chairperson of the Council.

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

The IQAC aims at quality sustenance and coordinates and supervises the post-accreditation programmes. It develops an action plan for the academic year and forwards suggestions and recommendations in important areas related to need-based academic programmes.

Central Planning Committee

The Committee undertakes the overall planning of the activities on the campus. It gathers proposals from various departments and monitors the implementation of the proposals.

Parent-Teacher Association (PTA)

The Parent-Teacher Association aims at a co-operative effort on the part of the parents and teachers for the overall development of the college. This association conducts seminars on Career Guidance, Counselling and also sees that vocational training classes are conducted for the students. Financial aid for economically backward and deserving students and awards for proficiency are some of the other services rendered by this association.

Executive Body

The Executive Body executes all the decisions made by the IQAC. Executive Body members include the Principal, Heads of Departments, the Staff Secretary, the Staff Advisor and the Chairman of the College Union. Executive Body includes sub committees constituted by faculty and student members.

Publications Committee

The Publications Committee is incharge of bringing out the publication in the college – News letter, College Magazine, and also the publication of conferences and seminars.

IT Committee

The IT Committee has been set up to look into the setting up of IT Labs and to implement the courses designed by the departments. The College provides training programmes to the students to improve their soft skills and English language competency.

Research Committee

The Research Committee is constituted to enhance the academic programmes in the college. It keeps the members of the faculty informed of the schemes of the UGC and other funding agencies.

The committee also makes sure that the proposals are submitted on time and that follow-up action is taken.

Website Committee

The Committee is incharge of updating the College website periodically to make sure that the information related to both academic and non-academic matters of the college is provided and updated.

Handbook Committee

This Committee is responsible for updating the College Handbook which is an annual publication that provides information about the College.

ACADEMIC COMMITTEES

College Level Monitoring Committee

This Committee is responsible for the conduct of the First Degree Programme. It ensures minimum instructional days and makes arrangements for internal examinations, timely uploading of the CE and registration of students for the examination. The Committee supervises course outcomes and programmes' specific outcomes and updates syllabus in the college website. The Committee consists of the Principal who will also serve as the chairman, a convenor and Heads of Departments.

Academic Audit Committee

The weekly work plan is prepared by the faculty which is subsequently audited by the IQAC, the HoD and the Principal weekly, monthly and annually.

Feedback Committee

This committee collects feedback from the students and all stakeholders, which is analysed by the committee and recommendations are given for appropriate improvement.

Examination Committee

The Examination Committee is responsible for conducting the University exams for the Under Graduate and Post Graduate courses. This Committee works in unison with the Academic Forum.

Library Committee

The Library Committee aims at promoting equitable access to all information resources. The Committee is responsible for recommending, selecting and purchase of books for the library. Members of the Committee are the Librarian, three senior teaching faculty drawn from the Science, Arts and Commerce streams and a member of the IQAC.

OTHER COMMITTEES

Discipline Committee

The Discipline Committee is incharge of ensuring the campus congenial to study. The Committee consists of senior faculty members, NSS Programme Officers, the Staff Advisor, elected members of the College Council and five elected student representatives of the College Union.

Ethics Committee

The Ethics committee is responsible for instilling basic human values in students thus making them better human beings. It also ensures that the code of conduct in the College is strictly followed.

CLUBS AND CELLS

Electoral Literacy Club

It is part of Election Commission of India. The Union organizes events. Chairperson is campus ambassador. Programmes are open to all. The Electoral Literacy Club aims at educating the students about voter registration, the electoral process and related matters. The club also seeks to familiarize the students about Audit Trail (VVPAT) machines, Electoral Voting Machines (EMV) and Voter Verifiable Paper.

Bhoomithra Sena Club

This club is constituted to address environmental issues and to build awareness among the students on the same. This initiative is supported by the Department of Environment and Climate Change. The club members maintain a bio-compost unit for the management of food waste.

Biodiversity Club

The main objective of the Club is to carry out programmes for conservation of local biodiversity in accordance with the State Biodiversity Acts. The club ensures to engage the members in activities enriching their understanding of the biodiversity inside and outside the Campus by organising awareness programmes. Enrichment of the floral and faunal components is done by way of conservation through activity that are carried out.

Young Communicator's Club

The Club is a collaborative venture between the Department of English and the Public Relations Council of India. The club is aimed at familiarizing the members with the nuances of public relations and the ways that young people can find their way in the corporate world. The club focuses on creating opportunities for articulate young women to be heard and looks to encourage them to pursue careers in media and public relations.

Speech Box Club

Also called 'The Idea Club' is envisaged as a rendezvous to initiate and voice ideas. It encompasses ideas and expressions, be it through oratory, drama, poetry, story telling or visual arts. It is a place for ASCAITES to come together to share their insights on life, politics and culture, language and college experiences and learning challenges.

Legal Aid Cell

This cell aims to equip students with basic legal literacy. It works as a platform for consultation of any legal issues related to property, marriage and other civil or criminal problems.

Arts Club

Elected members of the teaching faculty are put in charge of the activities of Arts Club. The Arts Club of the College bears responsibility for conducting various cultural programmes and competitions within the campus. The Club also supervises and

trains students for intercollegiate, state and national level competitions. The Club also organizes Film Festival in the campus.

The Sixth Sense Quiz Club

The Club meets on a weekly basis with the aim of helping students to acquire a strong base in General Knowledge. It encourages the students to keep in touch with current affairs.

Harmony - The Music Club

Harmony is a platform to showcase the musical talents of the students. At Harmony, students learn more about different kinds of music. The Club meets every week with the aim of promoting the hidden musical talents of the students without any kind of competitive attitude. This club is meant to enhance the cognitive ability and emotional and intellectual capabilities of students. Harmony club is thus aimed at promoting students to go beyond just academic excellence.

Debating Club

Effective speaking is one of the most essential arts that one needs to master and develop a vibrant personality. This club provides a platform for the students interested in public speaking and debates to sharpen their speaking skills.

Reading Club

This club aims to help students to develop a love for reading. The club also enhances the critical and analytical abilities of the students by regular discussions and reviews. The latest works as well as the classics are taken up for close reading and analysis. There is a concerted effort at vocabulary building and giving a historical perception of literature.

Dance/Vibrant Fitness Club

Vibrant Fitness Club aims at developing the students' self-esteem and confidence. The club helps students overcome challenging situations. Students can develop further social skills such as leadership and empathy. The club organizes activities like Zumba Fitness, Aerobics, Yoga, Dance and also different sports and games.

Film Club

This club functions in association with Kerala Chalachitra Academy. It aims to create an interest in all aspects of film making. A film fest is conducted annually.

Mashithandu Club

It is a club that aims at promoting interest in Malayalam literature through reading, discussions and meet the author sessions.

Library Club

The club is instituted with the aim to educate and enlighten the students in every aspect of attaining knowledge. Its objectives are...

- To cultivate reading habit among the students.
- To provide an idea about the library management and automation.
- To enlighten the students regarding the order of arrangement of books in the library.
- To create awareness about the functioning of digital library.
- To provide a dynamic and supportive setting for exploratory learning.
- To conceptualise, plan and organise reading related activities in the college.
- To conduct various competitions in the college related to reading.

Anti-Narcotics Club

Anti-narcotics club is a club to curb the menace of substance abuse among youngsters. Convened by the Station House Officer of the local police station, the 'anti-narcotics club' comprises the Principal, three faculty members, members of the Parent-Teacher Association (PTA) and student representatives of the college. The club envisages every student of the college to be goal oriented and innovative in protecting oneself and others against drugs and alcohol. The activities of the club include sensitization programmes

through awareness classes workshops, seminars, campaigns, poster exhibitions etc.

Entrepreneurship Development Club

Entrepreneurship Development Club functions under Innovation Entrepreneurship Development Centre (IEDC) with Registration number EDC/TVM/43/17. IEDCs are small incubators located within the colleges, where students having innovative ideas can pursue entrepreneurship along with their studies. At these centres, students can pursue entrepreneurial activities which include ideations, hackathons, business modelling sessions, and meet-the-mentor sessions.

Environment Club

The Environment Club aims to facilitate students' participation in finding solution to environment related problems faced by the society. It involves students' inaction-based programmes related to environment in their surroundings. The sole aim of the club is to motivate students to keep their surroundings green and clean by undertaking plantation of trees and thereby create a clean and green consciousness among students through various activities.

Science Club

The activities outside the college include giving awareness classes for school students and field visits.

Theatre Club

This will help create an awareness among the people regarding the major health hazards, the courses of many of the fatal diseases and their preventive measures.

Investment Awareness Club

The aim of the club is to impart knowledge about the fundamentals of investments especially in financial securities. It will equip the students in Investment planning and Tax management and in turn help them to identify various investment avenues independently to take right decisions This can help them to be financial consultants to the general public.

Ethics Club

The Ethics club is responsible for instilling basic human values instudents thus making them better human beings. It also ensures that the code of conduct in the College is followed.

STUDENT SUPPORT FACILITIES

Counselling & Psychotherapy Cell

This cell aims at providing counseling to students. It helps the students deal with both personal as well as academic problems. It helps the students to identify their strengths and weaknesses and choose their careers in accordance with this. To this end, the cell organizes seminars, workshops and career guidance programmes. The cell also extends the services of professional counselors to the students.

Career Guidance Cell

The Career Guidance Cell aims at giving students information and guidance on the best placements available. The cell conducts seminars and campus recruitment drives. It also coordinates career counselling sessions on the latest trends in the job arena.

National Service Scheme (NSS)

The aim of the NSS is personality development through community service. The NSS gives students opportunities to engage themselves in constructive action for social welfare. Educational, health related agricultural and self-employment programmes are included in the various activities.

The college is partnered with Govt. College, Dhaliara, Himachal Pradesh so as to learn more about the culture and history of the state.

Women Cell

GRIEVANCE REDRESSAL MECHANISM

Anti-Ragging Grievance Redressal Cell

The Cell looks into the grievances of the freshers. Two senior members of the teaching faculty, a senior member of the administrative staff and the student Counsellor make up this cell. A complaint box is set up for this purpose. The Committee takes the complaints related to ragging seriously and corrective measures are taken immediately.

Grievance Redressal Cell for Students

This Committee has the authority to settle grievances raised by the students of the College. The students are expected to lodge their grievances with their respective tutors who will in turn intimate the matter to the Committee for necessary action. If the matter is not resolved by the Committee, the student can approach the Principal.

Special Grievance Cell for the Welfare of SC/ST/OBC Students

This Cell has been formed to assist students belonging to the Scheduled Caste, Scheduled Tribes and Other Backward Community

Grievance Redressal Cell for Staff

The Cell functions according to the norms and procedures laid down by the University. It looks into the grievances of the Staff and Support Staff of the College.

Divyangyan Cell

As per the University Order regarding the formulation of the internal committee for the students with disabilities in the college, the council of the college has constituted an internal committee on 20th January 2019. FACILITIES

Library

Our Library is every Scholar's delight. With over 53000 books, 53 journals, 40 periodicals and 7 newspapers, it caters to academic and aesthetic interests. The Library has (a) General Section, (b) Postgraduate Section and (c) Internet facility. The Library is open from 9.00 a.m to 4 p.m on all working days including Saturdays. General Rules to be followed for library usage:

1. Personal articles such as books, bags, umbrella, files etc are not allowed in the library. It should be deposited at its property counter.
2. Students should access the library only through the Gate Register. This is to be done through electronic barcode reading of the admission number.
3. Library is a place of serious reading and silence. Strict silence should be maintained in the library and its premises.
4. Each student will be issued 2 library cards. Not more than two books at a time will be issued from the library. Books borrowed from the Library may be kept for a maximum period of 14 day sat a time. But the librarian reserves the right to call back any book before the expiry of the ban period.
5. If a book is not returned on or before the due date, an over due charge of Rs.1/-per book, per day shall be collected.

6. All markings, underlining, tearing of pages in any book is absolutely forbidden.
7. On receipt of the book the student should examine and report at once to the Library Assistant any damages of a run accounted for, in the book. If the student fails to do so, she shall be held responsible for any damage when it is subsequently detected by the Library Assistant.
8. Students are expected to handle the books carefully. If a book is damaged or soiled or lost by a student, she will have to replace the book or pay its current cost.
9. Reference Books, periodicals and publications will not be issued.
10. No student should sub-lend her library book or card.
11. All Books borrowed from the Library by the students and the members of the staff should be returned on or before the college closes for Onam holidays, Christmas holidays and Summer Vacation or on the date fixed by the librarian.

Gymnasium

A gymnasium with state-of-the-art equipment is at the disposal of both staff and students.

Infirmary

Indisposed students can rest in the infirmary. Basic amenities such as First Aid are also provided.

Store

Textbooks, notebooks, science records and students' requisites can be purchased from the College Store.

INSTRUCTIONS REGARDING COLLEGE AND PUBLIC EXAMINATIONS

1. Students should be on time. Five minutes before the commencement of the examination, there will be a long bell at which all should enter the hall. At the second bell, the question papers will be distributed.
2. No books and notes should be taken into the examination hall and strict silences shall be observed.
3. No paper should be detached from the answer books. No paper with the College/University seal should be removed from the examination hall.
4. Ten minutes before the end of the examination, a warning bell will be rung after which no one should leave the hall. At the close of the examination, a long bell will be rung at which all will handover their papers and leave the hall.
5. Students who finish early should leave the premises in silence.
6. No student will occupy any other chair than her own without the consent of the invigilator.
7. Parents and guardian should inform the Principal in time if their children or wards are unable to appear for an examination as absence from terminal examinations will be viewed seriously.
8. Students who absent themselves from Terminal Examinations will have to pay a fine. If absent on grounds of illness, a medical certificate will have to be produced.
