

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# College Report 2022- 2023

Welcome to the 59th college day celebrations of All Saints' College, Thiruvananthapuram. This year is a crucial one as it stands as a marker for the numerically significant 60<sup>th</sup> year of inception of this institution. It is on this cusp that we must reflect on our ethos as an institution - the ethos which formed the foundation upon which our beloved foundress, Mother Mary Veronica established the Congregation of the Carmelite Religious. As the world changes rapidly around us, we must, as an educational institution, learn to adapt to the challenges and be ready ever more now, than before to send forth confident, financially and legally literate, socially responsible and globally accountable young people. Thus, this year is one of introspection and most importantly, one of action.

Hence, respected dignitaries and stake holders, it is with a great sense of gratitude and pride that I, stand before you to present the report of the activities of the college during the academic year.

The National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) visited the college as part of its fourth cycle of assessment and awarded the college A+ grade with a grade point of 3.38, making it only the seventh college in the State to get this grade. The student support initiatives, teaching-learning process and the methodology followed in the assessment of pedagogy - were some of the strong points that the Peer Team visiting the college pointed out in its report. The college was felicitated by the University of Kerala and by the Honorable Government of Kerala for the grade it received. The college extends a sincere and hearty thanks to all the stakeholders who made this institution, what it is.

The college did not rest on its laurels, but we

resumed our activities – both academic and cocurricular in full swing.

The Academic excellence of the college was underscored by the ranks that we secured at the University level. Departments of Commerce, English, History and Environmental Sciences secured University ranks.

A learner centric approach has always been one of the core values of the institution and in keeping with that, we have ensured that the students receive a complete education. The first – year students were given a week-long orientation -Deeksharambh, that covered basic aspects of life in college, the intricacies of the semester system, etiquette, mental conditioning, bridging the attitudinal and approach – based gaps between school and college academic practices.

The current year saw the institution place a great emphasis on upskilling students. A number of add-on and certificate courses were introduced by all the departments either independently or in association with reputed agencies. A 36hour certificate course on Employability Skills was offered to all the final year students in association with the Mahindra Pride Classroom. This greatly boosted their chances at the various campus recruitments that the college conducted. The placement cell organized recruitment drives by VirtuEdge Management Services and Care Revenue for final-year students which saw 46 of our students securing jobs with multinational concerns.

The departments have introduced courses ranging from Python Programming in association with Network Systems, Jmol Applications in association with the Spoken Tutorial Programme of IIT Bombay, Content Writing with Keltron and National Skill Development Corporation, Indian Constitution and Governance with the Indian Institute of Public Administration. There are more such certificate courses underway. The aim is to ensure that the students have an option to upgrade their skills and gain additional qualifications that can pave the way for research or employment.

The college also enhanced the experiential learning opportunities of the students by providing them with intelligent and organic modes of learning. Using events such as Wetland Schooling, Mock Parliament, field visits, visits to places of importance, the institution ensured that the curriculum was delivered more effectively. The various departments and clubs organized interactive sessions with people of eminence in order to help the students broaden their perspectives and learn about the developments in their fields. Participative sessions with scientists, educators, authors, poets and social workers helped students enrich their knowledge base. Various national and international seminars were organized by the departments and the students were the direct beneficiaries of the same.

The creative restructuring of assignments and projects have seen students being more involved in problem solving. Projects and assignments that look to assess issues specific to the immediate community, the locality, the state and the world in general have paid rich dividends. Our students are serving as interns in areas of environmental well-being with the Kerala State Remote Sensing and Environment and participating in initiatives by institutions such as IIT Kharagpur and Shri Shivaji Science College, Amaravathi.

These efforts of the college saw the students benefitting immensely as students presented papers at national and International seminars, published papers in Journals and as book chapters and won prestigious scholarships:

Ms. Faseela V. S. Research Scholar at the Dept of Environmental Sciences, under the guidance of Dr Smitha Asok, Assistant Professor, Department of Environmental Sciences was awarded the prestigious Paristhiti Poshini fellowship instituted by the Department of Environment and Climate Change, Ms Anjali A.R. and Ms Meera Hari, both research scholars with Dr. Kavitha N., Assistant professor, Department of English have been awarded the ASPIRE Scholarship instituted by the Government of Kerala. Ms Devi Krishna D, a student of S4 M.A. English Language and Literature won the best paper award at the International Multidisciplinary Students' Seminar conducted by REWA University.

The institution saw the students at their best as they organized exhibitions on topics ranging from Mathematics to holistic living. Fructus Expo and Green Culture were exhibitions of the Department of Botany to increase awareness about our fruits and plants. The exhibition of the Department of Mathematics – 'Mathematica ' saw the participation of schoolchildren- thus ensuring educational outreach.

The campus was a vibrant location this year with co-curricular activities being carried out along with these academic initiatives. Students participated in celebrations such as Onam and Christmas and brought out the festive spirit in all its glory. The PTA sponsored Payasam for Onam and Cake for Christmas. The students truly lent meaning to these festivals by celebrating responsibly. Donations were made by the students in the form of White Gifts for the needy. The celebration of Fresher's Day, Union and Arts Club inauguration, Arts fest, film festival- all conducted by the college union and the Arts Clubbrought out the many talents of the students and helped them gain confidence.

The students really shone on the sports field with many of our students gaining selection at University and National levels. Our students have excelled at sports such as Football, Archery, Power Lifting, Boxing, Wushu, Roll ball, Athletics and so on.

Ms Shyni L. S. DC II History participated in the Asia Karate Open Championship in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.

There has been appropriate emphasis on the mental well being of the students as well with regular sessions on Yoga, Zumba and motivational sessions. There is a counsellor on campus who is sponsored by the Management of All Saints' College, who carries out appropriate interventions.

The spirit of nationalism is very much a part of the life of the college, with a number of events marking significant days such as Independence day, Republic day, Martyrs' day, Army Flag day being celebrated with great enthusiasm. The Freedom Wall painted by the students is a testament to their creativity and patriotism.

The institution is committed to ensuring a quality educational experience and hence works to form meaningful collaborations with institutions of good standing and repute. The college has regular interactions with NGOs such as Sustera, Naandi Foundation, Think Tanks such as Indian Institute of Public Administration, Institute of Parliamentary Affairs, educational institutions such as Christ University, Bangalore. The Department of English has a Faculty Exchange Programme with St Joseph's College, Alappuzha and St Teresa's College, Ernakulam and media such as All India Radio and Mathrubhumi. The college also has Memorandums of Understanding with industry and other institutions towards providing a meaningful educational experience through certificate courses, training programmes, technical expertise and consultancy and so on.

The various clubs of the college have been doing an excellent job of channelizing student energies towards socially and globally relevant initiatives. The Bhoomitra Sena Club has been encouraging planting of saplings and they have also started a vegetable garden on campus. The 'Green Testimonio' was an initiative that saw students observe environmental issues around them and document the same. Clubs of national importance such as the Electoral Literacy Club and Forum for Social Democracy and Justice saw students comprehending the importance of democracy and the ways that one must exercise one's rights. There were sessions on the importance of democracy as well as interactions with government officials on the importance of voting. The Women Cell of the college, instituted in association with the Kerala State Women's Development Corporation organized sessions on women's health, hygiene, well being and on the importance of being legally aware. The Jesus Youth wing of the college focused on lending a sense of stability through good and faith in the lives of the students. The Department of Commerce has stressed on the importance of entrepreneurship and financial literacy and hence has started clubs such as the Financial Literacy club, Investment Awareness Club, Entrepreneurship Development Club and Tourism Club. The activities of these clubs are focused towards creating capabilities in students to become entrepreneurs in their own right and to be able to handle their finances responsibly. Harmony Club, the music club of the college organized interesting competitions such as patriotic song competition at an intercollegiate level, thus, bringing talents from across the state to the campus. Members of the club regularly perform at important functions and thus greatly enhance the enjoyment quotient of the college activities. The Dance Club of the college, Nritya has brought cheer to the students through its various dance related activities that contributed greatly to the creative talents of the students and also saw students paying attention to their physical and mental well-being. The Quiz club of the college, Sixth Sense has been encouraging a quizzing culture on campus and students have been bringing laurels to the college through the various prizes that they have won at the various quiz competitions. Apart from this, there have been regular quiz competitions on campus

as well. The Anti-Narcotics Cell of the college has been functioning with vigilance to ensure students are aware of the dangers of addiction. Regular interactive sessions with government agencies and awareness sessions have made students aware of the importance of prevention of addiction in the immediate vicinity as well. The NSS unit of the college has once again performed exceedingly well by carrying out vital outreach. Arranging Blood Donation drives, Beach Cleanups, Food donation drives, Anti-corruption campaign have been some of the distinguished activities of the NSS this year. The NSS has also done extensive outreach in palliative care and in the Vimukti initiative of the Government of Kerala. The NSS members have closely interacted with agencies such as Palium India to not only train its own volunteers but also to understand the needs of those undergoing palliative care. The NSS undertook a massive campaign against drugs through Flash Mobs, Awareness marches, video campaigns and so on. These commendable activities of the NSS unit of our college have won it accolades in the form of the following awards:

The college has been at the forefront of a number of socially inspired collaborations. The care it shows in ensuring focused outreach has socially conscious agencies collaborate with us in their consciousness-raising initiatives. The Ek Bharat Shresht Bharat Club collaborated with Ms Rajani Rao, Alumna and Honorary member, Junior Chamber International, who is a part of the Clean Plate challenge India - an initiative to reduce food wastage. She is on a mission to raise awareness by travelling to all the state capitals of India and the South India leg of her journey began at All Saints' College.

The College collaborated with Sare Jahan Se Acha Foundation, through a Flash Mob by the Nritya Club - to raise awareness regarding the hazards of spitting in public places. The Women Cell organized flash mobs at Thampanoor and Palayam on 1<sup>st</sup> November to raise awareness regarding Drug Addiction and with the NGO Thanal to showcase the dangers of single use plastic. The college also collaborated with the Indian Institute of Public Administration to highlight the importance of Coastal clean-up this was part of the National campaign for cleaner coastlines. The Bhoomitra Sena Club members participated in an event, ON Air in association with NGO - Sustera about air pollution and the future of Electronic Vehicles in Kerala.

The outreach initiatives of the college extend beyond these agencies as well through its flagship initiative – Communities of Practice – an initiative that looks to actively seek out collaborators and create impactful change locally, regionally, nationally and globally. This year, the Communities of Practice organized a two - day Conference titled 'Let Us Dream' -Annual Community Conference. Community collaborations in the Post Pandemic world was the theme of the conference that saw NGOs, activists, climate warriors, social media collaborators and influencers airing their views.

The college has also been creating tangible change through the Unnat Bharath Abhiyan that it is part of. The college has been working closely with vulnerable communities residing in Palode, Kallikad, Alamcode and Azhoorand has been carrying out systematic discussions with the stakeholders regarding the issues of development and health that the people face. The college has taken a hands-on approach and is looking to carry out timely interventions in the areas of health care, employment and income security and social participation. The staff of the college has been at the forefront of research activities and they have fostered a research culture among the students as well. Five of our teachers have been awarded PhD this year.

Three members of the faculty have been granted the status of research supervisor the University of Kerala. These numbers are only set to rise in the coming days. The research centres of the college are flourishing, with three submissions and one degree being awarded. The college has applied for sanction for more research centres and is to take a quantum leap in the coming years in terms of research. Our teachers have won coveted research grants: Dr Smitha Asok, Assistant Professor, Department of Environmental Sciences has been awarded a research grant of nearly 26 lakhs. Our teachers have presented more than 32 papers at various national and international conferences, published papers in reputed journals and have book chapters to their name. Ms Nimmy Mohan, Assistant Professor, Department of Chemistry has secured a patent.

Dr Parvathy Menon, Asst Professor, Dept of History received the Padmasree Prof. Parassala Ponnammal Memorial Sangeetha Shreshta award and Dr Udayakala C. Head, Dept of Malayalam received the Saraswatha Saamskarika Vidyashreshta award, both constituted by Kalanidhi trust.

The college has organized various National and international conferences, Workshops and poster competitions on Avantgarde research. The Library of the college has also become a proactive space for research with sessions on Academic integrity and Online databaseoriented research. Our teachers are much sought after resource persons and speakers at national and international conferences as well as coveted guests for keynote lectures at schools and colleges. This is a recognition of the cultural and intellectual capital that the college has garnered on account of its tradition of excellence.

All this translates into a meaningful experience for our students who are also consequently exposed to these knowledge sharing initiatives. This has made the students confident individuals who are sought after in the higher education as well as the employment scenarios. The Placement cell has been working in close association with the Government of Kerala to ensure upskilling and reskilling of students. Tuning camps for students of minority communities, orientation camps for further employment, registration initiatives for empaneled employment have all been carried out. A One-day personality development workshop for meritorious minority students organized by Kerala Minority Development Corporation and a 'placement readiness' program organized by the Kerala university were conducted in association with the placement cell. The placement cell also provided interested students the opportunity to attend the program 'Thozhil Rangathekk' organized by the Kerala Knowledge Economy Mission.

The college has also joined hands with the Centre for Adult and Continuing Education, University of Kerala to conduct university approved certificate courses. The college is a functioning nodal centre of Indira Gandhi Open university.

The challenges of the semester system and disruptions caused by external factors placed an immense amount of pressure on the functioning of an educational institution. But we are in a constant attempt to overcome those challenges ensure an empathetic, competitive and educational experience for the students. The future years will see bigger and bolder initiatives educational towards outreach, upskilling, entrepreneurial and professional capability enhancement. Tobacco-the silent killer has become a global concern. Irrespective of status, it is used by everyone, everywhere. It accompanies a person in his merrymaking and miseries and leads him to death.

There are various reasons why people start using tobacco products. The most common cause is curiosity. Children also try such products persuaded by friends or to imitate their favorite actor. But this at least one-time use becomes frequent and then every time. Family members who smoke also influence the youth.

Tobacco use harms nearly all organs of the body. A smoker's cough is the most common trait of tobacco users as the airways get blocked. The effects of tobacco are different in adults and children. Lung cancer, heart disease, and stroke occur in adults, while children experience respiratory illness, asthma attacks, ear infections, and sudden death syndrome. Tobacco consumption also causes arthritis, diabetes, and skin problems like psoriasis.

The tobacco industry influence social life, the economy, and the environment. Tobacco, considered a sign of power and manliness, prompts more people to use it. Excessive use of tobacco shatters personal and professional life. Tobacco crops extract nutrients from the soil making it less fertile and, the use of pesticides causes health effects to workers. Apart from the adverse effects, the tobacco industry has a positive impact on the economic sector. The tobacco industry is a livelihood to around 4.57 crore people who work as farmers, farm laborers, and industry staff.

Unfortunately, passive smokers face the ill effects of tobacco, even if they don't use it directly. The mainstream smoke and smoke emitted from cigarettes are equally dangerous for smokers and people nearby. The impacts of passive smoking differ for adults and children. While adults experience low lung capacity, heart diseases, cancer, and so on, children suffer from continuous cough, cold, and breathlessness.

India is the second-largest tobacco consumer and the third-largest tobacco producer in the world. Tobacco outlets, especially in the countryside, are a livelihood for many. Moreover, India is considered the oral cancer capital of the world. Apart from men, women have also started using tobacco, which causes osteoporosis in women, a bone disease. When pregnant women use tobacco, it results in growth retardation and weight decrease in babies.

Nicotine, the main content of tobacco, lures the users. If a regular tobacco user does not use it a day, cravings occur. We have seen the hands of an alcohol consumer shivering when he does not get alcohol for a day. The period of withdrawal syndrome varies. The symptoms include physical effects like headache, fatigue, constipation, cravings, cough, and loss of appetite. Anxiety, depression, getting irritated by small things, and difficulty concentrating are the mental and emotional symptoms of withdrawal effect.

India has reduced tobacco use among adults by 17% since 2010. The prevalence of tobacco among youth has also decreased. WHO congratulated the Indian Government for its measures in curbing the tobacco epidemic. India has increased tobacco taxes at the highest rate of 28% under GST at the state level. Mass media campaigns were also of great help to reduce smoking among youth and young adults. Many states have banned gutka, deadly, smokeless tobacco. India has prohibited advertisements promoting tobacco. The COTPA Act has also helped in preventing the spread of tobacco products in many ways. In 2019, the country banned battery-powered E-cigarettes which had flavoring substances other than nicotine. Indian Council of Medical Research prohibited its usage in the country due to the health issues it caused and environmental hazards caused by manufacturing and waste disposal. It has been advised, for educational institutions, to ensure no shops within 100 yards of their premises sell tobacco.

The young generation is easily enslaved by tobacco. Parents must explain the health issues of using tobacco to children through animations and simple stories. Moreover, they must also not use tobacco in front of children. Schools must appoint

student monitors to report tobacco usage among friends and local distributors near the school to the authorities. Resident associations and educational institutions must ensure a smoke-free environment. Schools and social organizations must ensure the involvement of students in the programs for tobacco prevention through interactive sessions with officials.

Every year, May 31 is celebrated as World No Tobacco Day by World Health Organization (WHO) since 1987. This day has great importance in making people aware of the consequences of using tobacco. The COVID-19 Lockdown imposed, led many people to start using tobacco. Also, many tobacco users suffered from withdrawal syndrome. The government has begun a toll-free service in 16 languages, where they would be helping to quit tobacco usage. Children are the easiest to get addicted to tobacco. Around 90% of adult tobacco users started using it during childhood. Hence, the primary purpose of World No Tobacco Day must be to ensure the youth a healthy future free from tobacco.

Being aware of the after-effects of tobacco use, we imperil our lives only for pleasure. We decide the first time to use tobacco and the next time tobacco decides. Life is only once. Paying attention to the little things around us, spending time with loved ones, and doing what we love are healthy ways of enjoyment rather than being slaves of tobacco. ●

The Drugs addiction is a very complex socioeconomic issue that affects millions of people in the worldwide directly and indirectly. Drug abuses continue to remain one of the biggest challenge and threat to the society in general. It is one of the critical issues that the World Health Organization (WHO) is struggling to address with and eliminate. Today, many people who are addicted to drugs face social stigma and discrimination that further harms their physical and socio-psycho health condition. It also prevents them from seeking the necessary support and treatment they require to overcome it. The United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) emphasizes the importance of taking a people centric approach to drug policies with a focus on human rights, compassion, and evidence based practices.

The existing studies on drugs addiction have found a high correlation between adolescent abuse and becoming a problematic drug user in adulthood. In addition, accident and intentional fatalities associated with drugs and alcohol use is one of the leading preventable causes of early deaths for the fifteen to twenty four year old population world at large. Use of alcohol and drugs among the adolescents population carries a high risk for school under achievement, delinquency, teenage pregnancy, suicides and depression. The international day against drug abuse and illicit trafficking or called world drug day is marked on 26th of June every year to strengthen the action and cooperation in achieving the world free of drug abuse.

Every year on 26th of June, UNODC issues the World Drug Report, full of key statistics and factual data obtained through official sources, a sciencebased approach, and research. Accordingly, the aim of the year 2023 World Drug Day campaign is to raise awareness about the importance of treating people who use drugs with respect and empathy; providing evidence-based, voluntary services for all; offering alternatives to punishment; prioritizing prevention; and leading with compassion. The campaign also aims to combat social stigma and discrimination against people who use drugs by promoting language and attitudes that are respectful and non-judgmental. The theme of the year 2023 is "People first: stop stigma and discrimination, strengthen prevention"

On the occasion, along with educating the public with regard to elimination of drug addiction and abuse, we should also acknowledge and appreciate the enormous works of antidrug and anti-narcotic organizations, police departments, and voluntary organizations working for rehabilitation. Furthermore we must pledge to act locally and think globally for making our society free from narcotic agents and their products. Hence, come let us uphold the hands of one another and respond to the call of World Drug Day- 2023 to:

- Raise awareness about the negative impact of stigma and discrimination on people who use drugs and their families.
- Raise awareness about the AIDS and hepatitis epidemics among people who use drugs and expand and strengthen HIV and hepatitis prevention programmes.
- Promote evidence-based, voluntary services for all people who use drugs.
- Educate about drug use disorders, available treatments and the importance of early intervention and support.
- Advocate for alternatives to imprisonment for drug-related crimes, such as community-based treatment and services.
- Combat stigma and discrimination by promoting language and attitudes those are respectful and non-judgmental.
- Empower young people and communities to prevent drug use and addiction.



# Will The Russia-Ukraine War Change The Future of International Politics?



Russia would be more restless if these nations succeed in joining NATO and this will create a devastating situation in Europe which will have a spillover effect throughout the world. This war has enabled the U.S. to reinstate its global hegemony after its unceremonious withdrawal from Afghanistan in 2020. But it has embittered the already worse relationship between the U.S. and Russia. Vladimir Putin is determined on restoring Russia's Soviet era supremacy and for achieving this Russia has sought out the aid of its past nemesis China, and the present relationship between China and Russia is at the highest point. This along with China's rivalry with India over its Line of Actual Control (LAC) standoffs have put India in a dilemma. India is fearful of Russia's fast blooming friendship with China, which has led to its seeking assurances from western countries such as the U.S., the U.K., France et al. The West, seeing this as an opportunity to curtail China's domineering economy and power has been a close ally of India.

The anarchist nature of the international system can be seen from this proxy war, where it is a means to flaunt the supremacy of the West as well as Russia by making Ukraine a scapegoat. The U.S. and the West saw in the war, an opportunity to weaken Russia but as the war prolonged, the situation has had devastating effects for all. The U.S. and the West are dealing with acute inflation, whereas Russia is struggling in reeling out from its multitude of sanctions. The war has made the European nations think of alternatives for oil and energy other than from Russia, since their sanctions on Russia has raised the prices per barrel of crude oil, which has worsened the cost-of-living crisis. The war has opened a pathway to an increasingly important position for the Global South, where China aims to develop its hegemony. The U.S.' focus being on the conflict has enabled China to augment its control and power. The West being skeptical of China, has led to the West considering India as a more trustable partner and creating agreements and treaties with India to fortify their relationship. There has been a major focus on the Indo-Pacific Region and the Ukraine conflict has proved to be a lesson to the other nations on the reliability as well as the power ratios of the competing nations.

India's position on the global stage has pivoted to great heights and its role as a "mediating" power is well noticed. India has managed to withstand its "neutral" position regarding the conflict and has succeeded in not vexing both the contending parties by successfully walking on thin ice. The discounted oil supplied by Russia to its friendly nations such as India, made the West having a frustrated view of this situation but letting India slide is a mark of the powerless jumbled position that the West is in. They consider India to be an essential partner in countering China in Asia. The war can also lead to the creation of an alternative to the dollar supremacy through the various other transactions that are being carried out as in the case of the Ruble-Rupee transaction. Russia has assured that all its oil transactions would be only against ruble payments in the future. This will create an intricate situation among the western countries. The war has led to an obvious question in international politics of whether the era of unipolarity of the U.S. has come to an end. The U.S. has seen its position diminished as the global power with the increasing power of China, as a rival to the U.S.

supremacy. Europe is facing a dire situation and this has led to a weakening of the West. What is obvious is the rising power and economy of the Global South. The perils of the war resonated greatly in the West than in the East. This has created a tilt in the global power dynamics, with a proposed idea that the 21st century would be the "Asian Century." China with its ambition over Taiwan could either learn from the lessons of the war or try to create a similar situation as with the Russia-Ukraine conflict. It is to be noted that the relationship between China and the U.S. has been deteriorating and their hatred towards each other has been increasing throughout.

The 21st century is bound to be a century where we will witness great shifts in the global power situation which will be able to create an impact that is meant to be a bellwether for the ever evolving international politics. It is an age where countries are focusing on bolstering its defense powers and forming treaties and exercise with its allies. It will be an age of great distress and rivalry and will be an opportunity for other powers to rise.

music. And from the 12th century to 19th century there developed many regional forms called the musical plays or 'sangeetnataka'. Hence, the contemporary classical Indian dance forms have evolved out of these musical plays to attain the distinctive features.

### There are two aspects of dance

1. Tandava — the masculine denotes movement, rhythm, heroic

2. Lasya — the feminine is soft, lyrical and graceful and denotes grace, and 'abhinaya', 'bhava' and 'rasa'.

The classical Indian dance has eight dance styles– Bharatnatyam, Kathak, Kathakali, Kuchipudi, Manipuri, Mohinattam, Odissi and Sattriya.

### Bharatanatyam

The oldest and most widespread form of classical Indian dance; Bharatanatyam originated among the

Hindu temples of Tamil Nadu, to the southeast of the Indian peninsula. Believed to date back to the 4th century BC, the dance form is best associated with the Devadasi culture – an ancient tribe who served as courtesans of women and performers in Tamil Nadu's great temples. It was revived by Krishna freedom fighter. It was Iyer, who was also a by Rukmani Devi made popular Arundale, who learnt Russian ballet in Austria and began to learn Indian Classical dance after getting inspired. Rukmani Devi Arundale laid the foundation of Kalakshetra. The costumes of bharatanatyam are bright and colorful. They are inspired by the sari tradition of contrasting border colors, and the borders of the various pieces of costumes form patterns that decorate the dancer's form. Heavy lines of makeup are drawn around the eyes, extending outwards past the eyes. The pair of anklets or ankle bells (salangai in Tamil) are important part of Bharatnatym costume.

### Kuchipudi

Kuchipudi is the name of a village in the Krishna district of Andhra Pradesh. Traditionally performed by male Brahmanas in temples. There is a huge impact of Vaishnavism which has inculcated themes of Bhagavad Purana in the Kuchipudi dance.In 17th century Kuchipudi style of Yakshagaana was conceived by Siddhendra Yogi who was a talented Vaishnava poet. According to a popular belief, Siddhendra Yogi had a dream where Lord Krishna asked him to compose a dance-drama based on the myth of the bringing of paarijaata flower for Sathyabhaama, the most beloved queen of Lord Krishna. Therefore, in compliance, Siddhendra Yogi composed the 'Bhaamaa-kalaapam'. It is an important part of Kuchipudi.It was patronised by Vijayanagar kings and Golconda rulers in past. Kuchipudi combines 'lasya' and 'tandava'.There are two forms of Kuchipudi – the traditional musical dance-drama and the solo dance.The costume of kuchipudi has a long pleat in the centre with a border and a back katcham and also a side small fan makes this a typical Kuchipudi style.

#### Odissi

It is one of the earliest dance forms in India. Evidences are found in Udayagiri and Khandagiri caves. Various

buddhist, tantric images of dancing Yoginis, Nataraja, and Shaivite temple influences resulted in an unique philosophy of the dharma or faith of Jagannath.The Devdasis were known as 'Mahari's were indispensible part of the odissi dance culture. After 12th century, there was great influence of Vaishanavism and bhakti cult on the Mahari system. The Mahari system declined largely because ascetics of Vaishnavism disapproved of immoralities of the devdasi system. This lead to the introduction of young boys dressed as women, dancing like Maharis, known as Gotipuas. Gotipuas quit dancing when they turned 18 and began teaching. Many

gurus of Odissi come from the Gotipua

tradition.With influence of Vaishnavism, Jayadeva's Ashtapadi become a compulsory item in Odissi dance.Important postures in Odissi are – Tribhanga posture (with 3 bends at head, bust and torso = mobile sculpture) and Chowk posture.The costume of Odissi is similar to that of traditional Bharathanatyam costume. The dancer wears elaborate Odiya silver jewellery and a special hair-do. The sari, that is usually stitched nowadays, is unique to the style of Odissi.

### Kathakali

It was performed in Kerala temples as dance dramas. The sources of kathakali are Kudiattam, Krishnattam, and later Ramanattam created by Raja Balaveera Keralam, which later evolved into Kathakali. Kathakali is performed on Open air stage against lush green Kerala landscape. No props are required, and expressions suggest the scene of dance drama.

There is elaborate make up where the colour of makeup indicates the mental stages of the character such as green facial colour indicates nobility, virtue, divine. Red patches on nose indicate royalty and

evil while black face indicates wicked female. There is remarkable use of eye movements and expressions in Kathakali. Themes of epics and puranas are largely depicted in Kathakali. Kathakali is a blend of dance, music and acting and dramatizes stories, which are mostly adapted from the Indian epics which mainly represents eternal conflict of good and evil. The costume of Kathakali is most distinctive to Kathakali dance. The costumes are very large and heavy. There are several types of costumes: Sathwika (the hero), Kathi (the villain), Minukku (females), and Thatti. Each character is instantly recognised by their characteristic makeup and costume. The dancers wear large head dresses mainly Kireedam, and the contours of face are extended with use of moulded lime.

### Mohiniattam

It is a dance that originated in Kerala. The origins of Mohiniattam are traced in the reign of Maharaja Swati Thirunal of Travancore in early 19th century. Mohhiniattam combines elements of Bharatanatyam (grace and elegance) and Kathakali (vigour). It is a solo dance where women perform the dance. Mohiniattam is more exotic, lyrical and delicate than both bharatanatyam and Kathakali from which it derives elements. The costume of Mohiniattam is refined and distinct. The costume color is white with gold zari borders. The skirt around torso is fully pleated from front to back.

### Manipuri

It is different from other classical dances as it emphasises bhakti and not sensous aspects due to high Vaishanv influence. The origins of Manipuri dance are traced back to ancient times which go beyond the recorded history. The dance in Manipur is mainly associated with the rituals and traditional festivals, with legendary references to the dances of Shiva and Parvati and other gods and goddesses who created the universe. With the arrival of Vaishnavism in 15<sup>th</sup> century A.D., new compositions based on the life of Radha and Krishna were gradually introduced in Manipuri

and eventually the popular Rasleela dances of Manipur originated. The most popular forms of Manipuri dance are the Ras (Radha, Krishna and the gopis), and the Sankirtanaand the Thang-Ta. The martial dancers of Manipuri are known as the 'Thang-ta' originated when man's survival depended on his ability to defend himself from wild animals. The Manipuri dance in its present form was promoted by Rabindranath Tagore in Shantiniketan in early 19th century.

The most elaborate costume of Manipuri dance is for the Ras dance. Ras costume consists of a richly embroidered stiff skirt which extends to the feet. A short fine, white muslin skirt is worn over the stiff skirt. A dark coloured velvet blouse covers the upper part of the body and a traditional white veil covers a special hair-do which falls gracefully over the face.In the Ras dance, Krishna wears a yellow dhoti, a dark velvet jacket and a crown of peacock feathers. The jewellery worn is very delicate and the designs are unique to the region.

#### Sattariya

Sattriya dance of Assam developed in the 15th century A.D by the great Vaishnava saint and reformer, Mahapurusha Sankaradeva. Shankardeva developed Sattariya dance as a powerful medium for propagation of the Vaishnava faith. It is especially associated with the Majuli island in Brahmaputra river. The Sattras are 'Vaishnava maths' or monasteries. Due to its religious character and association with the 'Sattras', this style of dancing has been aptly named 'Sattriya'.Sattriya dance tradition has strict principles governing it in respect of the hastamudras, footworks, aharyas and music. Sattriya tradition, has two distinctly streams –

1. the Bhaona-related repertoire begining from the Gayan-Bhayanar Nach to the Kharmanar Nach,

2. the dance numbers which are independent – like Chali (characterized by gracefulness and elegance), Rajagharia Chali, Jhumura (characterised by vigor and majestic beauty), Nadu Bhangi etc.

### Kathak

The word Kathak is derived from the word Katha meaning a story. Kathakars are story-tellers, who narrate stories based on the epics, myths and legends. The Vaishnavite cult which

was prevalent in North India in 15th century and the resultant bhakti movement introduced new forms of lyrics and musical forms. The Radha-Krishna theme was immensely popular along with the works of Mirabai, Surdas, Nandadas and Krishnadas. Raslila Developed in the Braj region (Mathura in Western U.P.) combined music, dance and the narrative together. The advent of Mughals developed the bhava and sensous aspects of the dance form taking it from temples to the courts.

Kathak is also the only classical dance of India which has links with Muslim culture. It represents a unique synthesis of Hindu and Muslim traditions in art. Kathak is also the only form of classical d a n c e w h i c h involves

Hindustani music (the North Indian music). Hindustani music has seen a parallel growth with Kathak, with each feeding and sustaining the other.

तीसरे दुश्य में सारे मुख्य पात्र एक साथ मंच पर दिखाई देने लगते हैं। भूखी बच्ची, बच्ची के हमउम्र है। इस दुश्य में बच्ची यह जान जाती है कि सिर्फ उच्च वर्ग के लोग मात्र अंग्रेज़ी में बात नहीं करते बल्कि लोगों को भी यह भाषा आती हैं। बच्ची उनसे भुख का मतलब जानने की कोशिश करती है। पर चालाक भुखी बच्ची उसे पहले बताने को तैयार नहीं होती। वह तब तक नहीं बताना चाहती जब तक उसे भरपेट खाना खिलाया न जाय। अंत में उसे परिवारवाले न चाहते हए भी खाना खिलाते हैं। भुखी बच्ची जब अकेले खाना खाती है तो बूढा और बूढिया उसे भला-बुरा कहते हैं। भूखी बच्ची किसी भी बात पर पीछे नहीं है। उसे पता है कि किस तरह लोगों से काम निकाला जा सकता है। इस बीच भिखारी जो गाने गाते हैं. उनसे पापा परिचित है। उसे याद आता है कि वह गाना उसके माता-पिता गाया करते थे। जिसके बोल वह भूल सा गया है या फिर याद ही नहीं करना चाहता। पापा के सोच के बीच मम्मी ज्यादा खाने से बेहोश सा हो जाती है और पापा ज्यादा सोचने से। मौका फायदा उठाते हुए बूढा, बुढिया और भूखी बच्ची घर के खाने लायक सब चीज़ों लेकर जाने को तैयार हो जाते हैं। बढा बच्ची को भी उठाकर ले जाना चाहता है और बच्ची के बदले तीन लाख रुपये बच्ची के पापा से ऐंठना चाहता है पर बुढि़या उसे रोक लेती है। इस बीच पापा को होश आता है तो बूढा, बुढिया और भूखी बच्ची खिड़की से भाग जाते हैं। यह सब देखकर बच्ची खबरा जाती है।

बच्ची इस हाद से यह जान जाती है कि भूख लोगों से क्या-क्या करवा सकते हैं। और उसे यह भी पता चलता है कि भिखारियों ने जो गाना गाया वह गाना उसके दादा-दादी गाया करते थे। इससे पापा की पुरानी यादें ताज़ा हो गयी है। उनके अन्दर अपने पापा-ममी के प्रति तिरस्कार और अपनी पुरानी ज़िन्दगी के प्रति घृणा ही है यह भी बच्ची जान जाती है।

प्रस्तुत नाटक के ज़रिये नाटककार ने आज के भारत की यथार्थता को हमारे सामने प्रस्तुत किया है। अपने व्यंग्य के कटार से नाटककार उन लोगों को लहू लुहान करते हैं जो बाह्याडम्बर के पीछे भागते हैं और अपनी पुरानी ज़िन्दगी को याद करके भी याद न करने का ढोंग करते हैं। साथ ही बच्चियों की भ्रूण हत्या पर भी चर्चा की गयी है, जो गैर कानूनी है। इस प्रकार भारत की समकालीन सच्चाइयों को हमारे सामने प्रस्तुत करने की कोशिश वैद जी ने भ्रूख आग है नाटक के ज़रिये किया है। ●

इसलिए टीचर के खिलाफ एक भी लफ्ज़ वह बर्दाशत नहीं कर पा रही थी। वह टीचर का ही पक्ष लेती है। मम्मी-पापा के बीच एस्से और टीचर के सम्बन्ध में इस बीच थोडी सी लडाई भी हो जाती है। पापा टीचर से मिलकर यह बताना चाहता है कि ऐसे वाहियात एस्से बच्चों को देने की ज़रूरत नहीं है। लेकिन मम्मी यही समझती है कि पापा टीचर से मिलकर उससे फ़्लर्ट करना चाहता है। इसलिए वे पापा को अकेले भेजना नहीं चाहती है। बच्ची बार-बार भूख का मतलब समझाने की बात करती हैं तो पहले उसका मतलब हंगर बताया जाता है और बाद में एपीटईट। लेकिन ममी-पापा बच्ची को ठीक उत्तर नहीं दे पा रही है। अंत में पापा बच्ची को यही बताता है कि पोवेरटी की वजह से भुख का जन्म होता है। तब बच्ची यह पुछती है कि पोवेरटी होती है तो क्यों? तब उसे समझाया जाता हैं कि लोगों के पास काम नहीं है। माँ का यही सोच है कि लोग मेहनत करना नहीं चाहते, वे कामचोर है। इस बीच बातें करते करते बच्ची को यह पता चलता है कि उसके दादा-दादी जो टीचर ये वे भी पोवेरटी का शिकार था और उसके पापा भी उसका शिकार हो चुका था। इसलिए पापा अपनी जिन्दगी के उस कडवे सच को भुलाना चाहते हैं, जिसे उसने बचपन में भोगा था। वह अपनी पत्नी या अपने बच्चों से भुख का रू-ब-रू करवाना नहीं चाहता। इसलिए वह यही कहता है कि उससे अच्छा उसे लोग डाकू ही समझे। बच्ची के बार-बार कहने पर यह तय किया जाता है कि पापा और बच्ची कुछ देर चुप रहकर एस्से का आउटलाइन तैयार करेंगे। अंत में सोचने से भी कुछ नहीं मिलते तो यह किया जाता है कि किसी भुखे से ही उसके सम्बन्ध में पूछ लिया जाय।

उच्च मध्यवर्ग और उच्च वर्ग हमेशा आम आदमी से दूर ही रहते हैं। वे भूख से अनजान है। इसलिए उन्हें इसके सम्बन्ध में कुछ भी पता नहीं है। और जिस यह पता है वे अपने गुज़रे ज़माने को याद करना भी पसंद नहीं करता, जैसे पापा। भूख के बारे में चर्चा करते वक्त और भी कुछ बातें सामने आती हैं। जैसे एबॉर्शन। अगर कोख में बच्ची निकली तो उसे पेट में ही मारा जाता। बच्ची सिर्फ बारह-चौदह साल की है, पर उसे पता है कि बच्चों के लिंग निर्णय के लिए टेस्ट करवा दी जाती है और यह गैरकानूनी है। उसे हिंदी की टीचर से सब पता चलता है। उसे अपनी सहेली से यह भी पता चला कि मम्मी का बेटा होनेवाला है। इसलिए ममी इतना खुश है। भारत में लोग आज भी बेटा-बेटी में फर्क रखता है-इस बात पर यहाँ पर नाटककार ने व्यंग्य किया है।

दूसरे दृश्य में जमा मस्जिद के आसपास के कबाब के दूकान और उसके आसपास रहनेवाले भूखे लोगों का दृश्य दिखाया गया है। जब बच्ची और उसका परिवार वहां खा रहे होते हैं तो उनके इर्द-गिर्द भूखे लोगों का जमा हो जाता है। अंत



इसे अस्तित्व में सबसे पुरानी युद्ध प्रणालियों में से एक माना जाता है।




