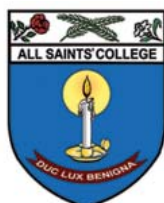

OUR HISTORY

- 1964 : All Saints' College is founded by Rev. Mother Mary Loiuse, CCR with the approbation of the Rt. Rev. Dr. V.V. Dereere, OCD, Bishop of Trivandrum. The College begins functioning in the Holy Angels' premises on 6 July 1964 with Miss Margaret P. Paulose as Principal and 277 students in the First Year Pre-Degree class.
- 1965 : On 15 May His Excellency the Most Rev. James R. Knox, Apostolic Internuncio to India lays the foundation stone of the first block of the College at Chackai, the permanent campus.
- 1967 : The College is shifted to the new campus at Chackai on 10 January. It is upgraded on 24 July with the introduction of Degree Courses in English, History, Economics, Mathematics, Chemistry and Zoology.
- 1980 : B.Sc. Botany and B.Com Degree Courses are offered for the first time in July.
- 1982 : The College receives sanction to commence the postgraduate course in English Language and Literature.
- 1993 : The first batch of B.Sc. Physics students begins the course.
- 1995 : M. Com. is the second postgraduate course to be introduced in College.

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- 1999 : The B.A. (Restructured) Course in Communicative English is introduced. The postgraduate course in M.Sc. Environmental Sciences commences as a multidisciplinary course.
- 2001 : The College is accredited by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) in July.
- 2008 : The College is reaccredited by NAAC with grade B (2.81) in March.
- 2011 : The College is selected as a centre for the Kerala State IT Mission (KSITM) programme, “Skill Enhancement Computer Training and Women’s Resource Centre in Colleges of Kerala” in January. The postgraduate course in M. Sc Environmental Sciences– which was initially a self-financing course – is regularized with the approval of the Government of Kerala. The Postgraduate Department of Environmental Sciences is constituted as a separate Department from 11 October.
- 2012 : All Saints’ College is one of the three colleges in Kerala under the Star College Scheme. This is a scheme initiated by the Department of Biotechnology (DBT) under the Ministry of Science and Technology, Government of India to nurture excellence in undergraduate Science.
- 2013 : The College celebrates its Golden Jubilee marking 50 years of academic excellence and service.

2014 : The B.Com (Travel & Tourism) Course is introduced. The College is recognised as an IGNOU Study Centre (Code : 40028) in January. The centre offers degree courses in Social Work (BSW), Commerce (B.Com) as well as postgraduate courses in English (MEG), Economics (MEC), Commerce (M.Com), History (MAH), Social Work (MSW), Women and Gender Studies (MAWGS).

A one-month course in Computer Literacy (CLP) is also offered.

The Golden Jubilee Inauguration was held on 7 September by Hon. Chief Minister Shri Oommen Chandy.

2015 : The Golden Jubilee Valedictory Function was held on 30 October and was presided over by Hon. Governor Justice (Retd.) P. Sathasivam.

2016 : The college is reaccredited by NAAC with grade A (3.01)

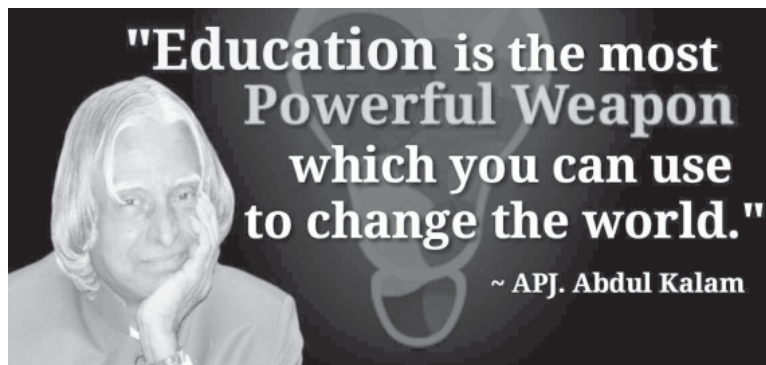

WORKING DAYS & CLASS TIMINGS

The College works from 9.30 a.m. to 3.30 p.m.

The morning session begins with the College Prayer. At the warning bell, students should go promptly and silently to their classes for the prayer.

The College Office is open from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on all days except Second Saturdays and public holidays.

RULES FOR STUDENTS

Students should strictly follow the rules of the College. It is the duty of every student to abide by the rules and regulations of the College and conduct herself with decency and decorum. Violation of rules will result in disciplinary action.

Identity Cards and Tags : College identity tags should be worn compulsorily in the campus. All payments, issue of certificates, marklist etc will be made only on production of the identity Card. The identity Card shall be surrendered to the office at the time of claiming the refund of caution deposit or issuing of transfer certificate whichever earlier.

Mobile Phones : The use of mobile phones is strictly prohibited on campus. As per the government order they will be confiscated with a fine.

Cyber Ethics : Students must not post derogatory or unfavourable comments against the college, teachers or other students on online platforms such as Facebook. Doing so is punishable as per the Indian Penal Code. Strict action will be taken by the college against students who are found guilty of this offense.

Ragging –A serious criminal offence : Ragging is a cognisable offence and is banned in the institution. Complaints regarding ragging should be lodged with the Anti-Ragging Cell. Stern action will be taken against those found guilty of participating in or abetting ragging. Action taken will depend on the nature and gravity of the offence:

- Suspension from classes
- Debarring from examination
- Expulsion from the college

No leniency will be shown in this regard. Those found guilty are also liable to be punished by the Court of Law and can be sentenced to rigorous imprisonment up to 3 years.

Every student has to submit a duly filled and signed undertaking against ragging to the anti-ragging cell.

Political Activities banned : Political Activity is strictly banned in the college as per the Honorable High Court. Students must not (i) circulate any note or paste it anywhere in the College (ii) collect money or (iii) organise any meeting, without the permission of the Principal.

CHARACTER AND CONDUCT

1. During Assembly all members of staff and students are expected to observe silence till the National Anthem is over
2. Students should come to College on time, neatly and modestly dressed.
3. Exemplary behaviour is expected from all the students both on and off campus. Students must behave in a manner befitting the principles and ethics of the college.
4. Students must keep the College clean and tidy. They have to compensate for any loss to college property.

OTHER RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. College notice boards should be consulted daily.
2. The bus cards must be brought every day. The cards are to be returned on or before the closing date.
3. Students are not permitted to leave the campus during class hours.
4. Students are not permitted to have visitors in College.
5. Free hours must be spent in the library.
6. Unauthorized collection of funds by students is not permitted. No money may be collected without the sanction of the class teacher or the Principal.
7. Prior written permissions of the Principal is necessary for organizing meetings, entertainment programmes, functions in the college; for collecting funds from the students/staff and for distributing notice or putting up any notice on the noticeboard.
8. Students shall not write or make any marks on the walls or any part of the college property. If found guilty, they are liable to be punished and the expenses for the repair work will be recovered from the offenders.

ATTENDANCE

- Students should be regular and punctual in attending the classes. Attendance will be marked at the beginning of each hour by the teacher engaging the class.
- If one teaching hour is missed it is equal to missing half a day's attendance
- Students who do not have at least 75% of attendance are not eligible to appear for university examinations.

- A student abstaining from classes without proper acknowledgement of leave for more than three consecutive working days will have to report to the college with her parent/guardian.
- Applying for leave of absence does not imply that the leave will be granted.
- The percentage of attendance shall be calculated coursewise. To determine the eligibility for registration for the ESE (End Semester Examination), the average of the course-wise percentage of attendance shall be considered. Benefits of attendance may be granted to students who attend University Union Activities, meetings of University Bodies and participate in extra-curricular activities by treating them present for the days of their absence for the above purpose on the production of a participation/attendance certificate in such activities issued by the University authorities/Principals, subject to a maximum of ten days in a semester.

Students should have subject attendance of 50% and aggregate 75% attendance.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE

1. A student requiring leave for an hour from the class must apply for it to the teacher concerned before the period begins.
2. A student requiring leave for a whole session or more must apply for it in writing to the Principal through the class teacher.
3. The application for leave should contain the following:
 - i. Name
 - ii. Residential address
 - iii. Class, Main and Roll No.
 - iv. No. of days of leave required with dates
 - v. Reason for leave
 - vi. Signature of the student with date
 - vii. Countersignature of parent/guardian/warden
 - viii. Countersignature of the class teacher with date
 - ix. Application for medical leave should be applied for with a proper medical certificate attached

FEE REGULATION

As per G.O.M.S. No.9574/H. Edn. dated 12 June 1974, tuition fees will be collected in eight equal instalments in the months of June, August, September, October, November, January and February respectively.

The first instalment of tuition fees, special fees and deposit will be collected from the students of senior classes within a period of seven consecutive working days beginning from the date of re-opening of the College. In the case of students of junior classes, the first instalment of tuition fees due till the date of admission with special fees and caution deposit will be collected on the date of admission. Subsequent instalments will be collected on or before the 7th consecutive working day of the concerned month.

Note: Amendment No. 72

1. It shall be open to students to remit the Tuition Fees as a lump sum at the beginning of the academic year.
2. If any student fails to pay the tuition and/or special fees on the due date, she shall be liable to pay a fine of Rs. 5/- along with the fees or Special Fees on or before the 10th day after the due date. If the 10th day happens to be a holiday, the next working day will be counted as the 10th day.

3. If the tuition fee and / or Special Fees with the fine of Rs. 5/- is not paid on or before the last date fixed for it, a fine of Rs. 15/- will have to be paid. If the fees and fine of an instalment are not paid before the last opportunity given for payment of that instalment, the name of the student will be removed from the rolls of the College with effect from the date following the expiry of that period and the student will not get the benefit of attendance also from the date of removal from the rolls of the College. If and when the amount due is paid and the student is readmitted, she will get the benefit of attendance from the date of readmission.
4. The last opportunity for payment of an installment of fees will be the last working day before the due date of the succeeding installment. But in the case of the fees due for February, the last date fixed is 5 March. If 5 March happens to be a holiday, then the last working day previous to such a date will be considered as the last date. If a student does not pay the dues till the last date prescribed, she will not be allowed to appear for the University Examination.
5. Fees will be collected at the College Office counter from 9 a.m. to 2.30 p.m. on working days.

CAUTION DEPOSIT

1. As per G.O.M.S.No. 58/75/H.Edn. Trivandrum dated 4 April 1975, every student on admission shall along with the first instalment of fees pay the Caution Deposit prescribed for each course. At the end of the course of study the Caution Deposit will be refunded on receipt of application from the student in the prescribed form avail-

able from the College Office, after adjusting all dues, if any. All claims for refund of Caution Deposit shall be made before the re-opening date of the next academic year in which the course is completed.

2. Students should keep the receipt issued for remittance of the Caution Deposit in safe custody. The deposit shall be ordinarily refunded only if the receipt is produced along with the application for refund. Failure to produce the original receipt can result in forfeiture of the claim for refund.

EDUCATIONAL CONCESSIONS

1. Fee concession and stipend will be given to candidates whose parents produce the Certificate of Registration, showing thereby that they belong to the Fishermen Community. However, they have to pay the Caution Deposit at the time of enrolment.
2. Students belonging to the Other Backward Communities, Socially and Educationally Backward Classes and the Forward Communities under the Kumara Pillai Commission Report, are eligible for fee concession. They have to (a) pay the Caution Deposit at the time of enrolment (b) produce an income certificate from the Village Officer, in the revised form. The income limit of the parents or guardians prescribed for the award of educational concessions to the OBC, SEBC students undergoing the Degree Course and PG course is below 6 lakhs per annum. The income of the guardians will be considered only if the parents are no longer living.
3. Students belonging to Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes and converts from these are exempted from paying the fees and Caution Deposit.

4. Students eligible for full fee concession (SC/ST), OBC, OEC and children of Registered Fishermen should submit their application to the Principal in the prescribed form available in the College Office within 15 days of their admission to the College.

STUDENTS' FUND

The Students' Fund is the lifeline of many of our underprivileged students. Aid is granted by way of relief in fees, financing, books, clothes and writing materials. The responsibility for disbursement of this fund rests with the Principal and the Management. Applications to avail of this fund must reach the Principal by 31 August.

STUDENTS' AID FUND

The University of Kerala provides a Students' Aid Fund for economically backward students. Applications to avail of this Fund must reach the Principal by 31 August.

ISSUE OF CERTIFICATES

Students requiring certificates of transfer, conduct and character, course, marks, bonafide should submit an application to the Principal and state their name, year of study, class number and course of study. Ordinarily a notice of 24 hours is required for the issue of a certificate.

ADMINISTRATIVE BODIES

College Council

This is a statutory body that advises and assists the Principal in all academic and administrative matters. The Council consists of the Heads of Departments, elected representatives from the teaching staff, a representative of the Management and the Principal who acts as the Chairperson of the Council.

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

The IQAC which aims at quality sustenance coordinates and supervises the post-accreditation programmes. It develops an action plan for the academic year and forwards suggestions and recommendations in important areas related to need-based academic programmes and the improvement of infrastructural facilities.

Central Planning Committee

The Committee undertakes the overall planning of the activities on the campus. It gathers proposals from various departments and monitors the implementation of the proposals.

Parent-Teacher Association (PTA)

The Parent-Teacher Association aims at a co-operative effort on the part of the parents and teachers for the overall development of the college. This association conducts seminars on Career Guidance, Counselling and also sees that vocational training classes are conducted for the students. Financial aid for economically backward and deserving students and awards for proficiency are some of the other services rendered by this association.

Executive Body

The Body executes all the decisions made by the IQAC. It is made up of the Principal, Heads of Departments, the Staff Secretary, the Staff Advisor and the Chairman of the College Union. Executive body includes sub committees constituted by faculty and student -

I. Publications Committee

The Publications Committee is in charge of bringing out the publications in the College – the newsletter, the college magazine and the college interdisciplinary research journal, Seek.

II. IT Committee

The IT Committee has been set up with courses designed by the members of this Committee. Satellite-enabled instruction in Spoken and Written English is offered. The College provides a comprehensive training programme to the students to improve their Soft Skills and English language competency.

III. Research Committee

The Research Committee is constituted to enhance the academic programmes in the college. It keeps the members of the faculty informed of the schemes of the UGC and other funding agencies. The Committee also makes sure that the proposals are submitted on time and that follow-up action is taken.

IV. Website Committee

The Committee is in charge of updating the website periodically. The college website www.allsaintscollege.in provides information about the College and its activities.

V. Info Bank

This Committee has been constituted to maintain a chronological record of the events in the College.

VI. Handbook Committee

This Committee is responsible for updating the College Handbook which is an annual publication that provides information about the College.

ACADEMIC COMMITTEES

College Level Monitoring Committee

This Committee is responsible for the conduct of the First Degree Programme. It ensures minimum instructional days and makes arrangements for internal Examinations, uploads

CE and does student registration. The Committee supervises course outcomes and programmes specific outcomes and updates syllabus in the college website . The Committee consists of the Principal, Heads of Departments and the elected representative of teachers in the College Council. The Principal shall be the Chairperson and a member selected by the CLMC from among the Heads of the Departments shall be the CBCSS coordinator.

Academic Audit Committee

The weekly work plan are prepared by the teacher and faculty which is subsequently audited by the HoD and principal.

Feedback Committee

This Committee collects feedback from the students and stake holders which is analysed by the committee and recommendations are given for appropriate improvement. as well as from their stake holders.

Examination Committee

The Examination Committee is responsible for conducting the University exams for undergraduate and postgraduate courses. This Committee works in unison with the Academic Forum.

Library Committee

The Library Committee aims at promoting equitable access to all information resources. The Committee has the responsibility of recommending, selecting and purchasing books for the library. The Committee is made up of the Librarian, three senior members of the teaching faculty drawn from the Science, Arts and Commerce streams and a permanent member of the IQAC.

OTHER COMMITTEES

Discipline Committee

The Discipline Committee is in charge of ensuring a campus congenial to study. The Committee consists of senior faculty members, NSS Programme Officers, the Staff Advisor to the College Union, elected members of the College Council and five elected student representatives of the College Union.

Public Relations Committee

The Public Relations Committee is the face of the college. It establishes cordial relations with the media and other agencies and thereby ensures the goodwill and support of the community.

Ethics Committee

The Ethics Committee is responsible for instilling basic human values in students thus making them better human beings. It also ensures that the code of conduct in the College is followed.

Equal Opportunity Cell

This cell helps the students with gender sensitization by being active in raising awareness of gender equality concerns. The cell conducts various gender sensitization campaigns, training workshops and other programmes.

Campus Beautification Committee

This Committee is in charge of preserving and enhancing the beauty of the college campus.

CLUBS AND CELLS

Electoral Literacy Club

The Electoral Literacy Club aims at educating the students about voter registration, the electoral process and related matters. The club also seeks to familiarize the students about

Electoral Voting Machines (EVM) and Voter Verifiable Paper Audit Trail (VVPAT) machines

Bhoomithra Sena Club

This club is constituted to address environmental issues and to build awareness among the students on the same. This initiative is supported by the Department of Environment and Climate Change. The club members maintain a bio-compost unit for the management of food waste.

Biodiversity Club

This club carries out programmes for conservation of local biodiversity in accordance with the state biodiversity acts. The Kerala State Biodiversity Board has sanctioned the prestigious Santhisthal project to All Saints' College in which one acre of land in the Campus is set aside for making a wood-lot with Rare, Endangered and Threatened (RET) species of flora.

Red Ribbon Forum & Club 25

In order to encourage voluntary blood donation among students and promote awareness of safe blood donation, the Red Ribbon Forum and Club 25 function in the college. Club 25 is a voluntary blood donation initiative through which members pledge to donate blood 25 times by the age of 25.

Legal Aid Cell

This cell aims to equip students with basic legal literacy. It works as a platform for consultation of any legal issues related to property, marriage and other civil or criminal problems.

Arts Club

To elected members of the teaching faculty are the elected and put in charge of the activities of Arts Club. The Arts Club of the College bears responsibility for conducting various

cultural programmes and competitions within the campus. The Club also supervises and trains our students for intercollegiate, state and national level competitions. The Club also organises a two-day Film Festival in the campus.

The Sixth Sense Quiz Club

The Club meets on a weekly basis with the aim of helping students to acquire a strong base in General Knowledge. It encourages the students to keep in touch with current affairs.

Harmony - The Music Club

Harmony is a platform to showcase the musical talents of our students. At Harmony, students learn more about different kinds of music like folk, light, western, ghazal, classical and fusion music. The Club meets every week with the aim of promoting the hidden musical talents of our students without any kind of competitive attitude.

Debating Club

Effective speaking is one of the most essential arts that one needs to master and develop a vibrant personality. This club provides a platform for the students interested in public speaking and debates to sharpen their speaking skills.

Reading Club

This club aims to help students to develop a love for reading. The club also enhances the critical and analytical abilities of the students by regular discussions and reviews. The latest works as well as the classics are taken up for close reading and analysis. There is a concerted effort at vocabulary building and giving a historical perception of literature.

Vibrant Fitness Club

Vibrant Fitness Club started with the aims of developing childrens' self esteem and confidence. Their ability to over-

come challenging situations improves. Students can develop further social skills, such as leadership and empathy. The club activities are Zumba Fitness, Aerobics, Yoga and different sports and games.

Film Club

This club functions in association with Kerala Chalachitra Academy. It aims to create an interest in all aspects of film making. A film fest is conducted annually.

Women on Wings

It is an innovation centre for skill development training and upgradation. It attempts to fulfil the broader objective of imparting skill enhancement training along with entrepreneurship development of the students of our college.

Mashithandu

It is a club that aims at promoting interest in Malayalam literature through reading, discussions and meet the author sessions.

Anti-Narco Club

Anti-narcotic club is a club to curb the menace of substance abuse among youngsters. Convened by the Station House Officer of the local police station, the 'anti-narco club' comprises the Principal, three faculty members, members of the Parent-Teacher Association (PTA) and student representatives of our college. The club envisages every student of the college to be goal oriented and innovative in protecting one-self and others against drugs and alcohol. The activities of club include sensitization programmes through awareness classes, workshops, seminars, campaigns, poster exhibitions etc.

Entrepreneurship Development Club

Entrepreneurship Development Club functions under Innovation Entrepreneurship Development Centre (IEDC) with

registration number EDC/TVM/43/17. IEDCs are small incubators located within the colleges, where students having innovative ideas can pursue entrepreneurship along with their studies. At these centres, students can do entrepreneurial related activities, which include ideathons, hackathons, business modelling sessions, meet-the-mentor sessions and so on.

Theatre Club

The Theatre Club provides students with exclusive opportunities to attend theatre and hold live performances.

Human Rights Club

The club aims at creating an awareness among students on the importance of Human Rights. The students are made aware of basic human rights and its relevance. Students are also trained to perceive the gross Human Rights violations taking place in society and learn how to react against them.

Ethics Club-Ephata

The Ethics club is responsible for instilling basic human values in students thus making them better human beings. It also ensures that the code of conduct in the College is followed.

STUDENT SUPPORT FACILITIES

Counselling & Psychotherapy Cell

This Cell aims at providing counselling to students. It helps the students deal with both personal as well as academic problems. It helps the students to identify their strengths and weaknesses and choose their careers in accordance with this. To this end, the Cell organizes seminars, workshops and career guidance programmes. The Cell also extends the services of professional counsellors to the students.

Career Guidance Cell

The Career Guidance Cell aims at giving students information and guidance on the best placements available. The Cell

conducts seminars and campus recruitment drives. It also coordinates career counselling sessions on the latest trends in the job arena.

Scholar Support Programme (SSP)

The Scholar Support Programme (SSP) is an initiative of the Department of Higher Education, Government of Kerala that seeks to impart personalized academic support to needy students through tutorials, additional lectures and interactive sessions. Internal mentors and external mentors help students in their respective subjects, Life Skills, IT Skills and Learning Skills. The topics handled in these sessions include confidence building, personal values, improving creativity, stress management, time management and public speaking.

Walk with a Scholar

Walk with a Scholar programme initiated by the Government of Kerala for under graduate students has provided the students a great platform to realize their career goals as well as to develop themselves better. All Saints' College, Thiruvananthapuram has undertaken the WWS programme with a vision to provide help to the students and has come up with a good team of 90 meritorious scholars, wonderful and facilitative internal mentors. Walk with a Scholar (WWS) scheme introduces the idea of mentoring and builds on the concept of mentor as a "Guide and Friend". The scheme aims at giving necessary orientation to needy students, to prepare them for employment and give them necessary guidance, motivation and necessary mental support to identify appropriate areas for higher study as well as employment. This scheme proposes to arrange specialized mentoring programme

for students in Under Graduate programmes in Arts, Science and Commerce and to provide guidance for their future. The mentoring should be planned to identify the areas suitable for students and the opportunities for learning to achieve the outcomes such as academic excellence, personal growth and social orientation.

The Women's Studies Cell

The Women's Studies Cell is part of the Women's Development Studies started by the U.G.C. Various programmes are conducted in the college to create awareness among the students about problems related to women. The Cell works for the development of the students, helping them to solve personal and academic problems. There is a Counsellor at the service of the students.

Vocational Training

A trained teacher is available on the campus to teach students the basics of garment-making, hand and machine embroidery, screen printing, fabric painting, jewellery making, doll making, beautician course and flower making. These classes are open not only to our students but also to those women who are interested in the same.

Consultancy Services

Consultancy services are made available to the community. Consultancy services are offered to industries, NGOs and other organizations of social concern.

Add On Courses :

Each Department offers various add on courses to the students that enables them to acquire job skills and also earn an additional certificate along with their Degree Certificate

GRIEVANCE REDRESSAL MECHANISM

Anti-Ragging Grievance Redressal Cell

The Cell looks into the grievances of the freshers . Two senior members of the teaching faculty and a senior member of the administrative staff make up this cell. A complaint box is set up for this purpose. The Committee takes these complaints seriously and corrective measures are taken immediately.

Grievance Redressal Cell for Students

This Committee has the authority to settle grievances raised by the students of the College. The students are expected to lodge their grievances with their respective tutors who will in turn intimate the matter to the Committee for necessary action. If the matter is not resolved by the Committee, the student can approach the Principal.

Special Grievance Cell for the Welfare of SC/ST /OBC students

This Cell has been formed to assist students belonging to the Scheduled Caste, Scheduled Tribes and Other Backward Community

Grievance Redressal Cell for Staff

The Cell functions according to the norms and procedures laid down by the University. It looks into the grievances of the Staff and Support Staff of the College.

Grievance Redressal Cell for students with disabilities

As per the university order regarding the formulation of the internal committee for the students with disabilities in the college, the council of the college constituted an internal committee on 20th January 2019. The main objective of the scheme is to provide encouragement and support to differently-abled students to pursue education.

ASSOCIATIONS

ASCAA (All Saints' College Alumni Association)

The Association fosters and maintains a network among old students of the college and works for the betterment of the Alma Mater. The ASCAA offers financial help to needy students and helps in upgrading the facilities on campus.

ASCATA (All Saints' College All Teachers' Association)

Our retired teachers have joined hands with the present staff and are actively involved in charitable work.

Departmental Associations

In addition, each department has its own association. In order to generate interest in the subject concerned, talks, seminar and exhibitions are regularly organized. Remedial classes are offered by all departments.

National Service Scheme (NSS)

The aim of the NSS is personality development through community service. The NSS gives students opportunities to engage themselves in constructive action for social welfare. Educational, health-related, agricultural and self-employment programmes are included in the various activities.

All India Catholic University Federation (AICUF) & Jesus Youth

As a Christian institution, the college takes a special interest in the religious and moral formation of the students. All Catholic students are the members of AICUF. Regular Christian Doctrine and Ethics classes are held for students. The Jesus Youth conduct an annual retreat, the first Friday Eucharistic Celebration, prayers, seminars, talks and leadership programmes.

COLLEGE UNION

The College Union is constituted every year in accordance with the University rules and regulations. The Union consists of the Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson, General Secretary, Arts Club Secretary, Magazine Editor, Secretary for Sports University Union Councillors and General Representatives who are elected by the students. The Union has the responsibility of organizing co-curricular activities in the College. It also represents the College at University meetings, Youth Festivals and intercollegiate competitions.

FACILITIES

Library

Our library is every scholar's delight. With over 52,500 books and 53 journals, 40 periodicals and 7 newspapers, it caters to academic and aesthetic interests. The Library has a (a) General section (b) Postgraduate section (c) Internet facility. The library will be open from 9.00 a.m to 4 p.m on all working days including Saturdays. The library has an active blog allsaintscollegelibrary.blogspot.com

General Rules

1. Personal articles such as books , bags, umbrella, files etc are not allowed in the library . It should be deposited at its property counter.
2. Students should access the library only through the Gate Register. This is to be done through their admission number
3. Library is a place of serious reading and silence. Strict silence should be maintained in the library and its premises

Borrowing and Returning of Books

4. Each student will be issued 2 library cards. Not more than two books at a time, shall be issued from the Library.

Books borrowed from the Library may be kept for a maximum period of 14 days at a time. But the librarian reserves the right to call back any book before the expiry of the loan period

5. If a book is not returned on or before the due date, an overdue charge of Rs. 1/- per book, per day shall be collected.
6. All marking, underlining, tearing of pages in any book is absolutely forbidden.
7. On receipt of the book the student should examine and report at once to the Library Assistant any damage so far unaccounted for, in the book. If the student fails to do so, she shall be held responsible for any damage when it is subsequently detected by the Library Assistant.
8. Students are expected to handle the books carefully. If a book is damaged or soiled or lost by a student, she will have to replace the book or pay its current cost.
9. Reference books, periodicals and publications will not be issued.
10. No student should sub-lend her library book or card.
11. All Books borrowed from the Library by the students and the members of the staff should be returned on or before the college closes for Onam holidays, Christmas holidays and Summer Vacation or on the date fixed by the librarian.

Computer Centre

The College is equipped with a Computer Centre which is permanently affiliated to the National Council of Vocational Trades (NCVT), Government of India. The Centre has the latest computers, software packages and a library with a good

collection of books on Computer Science. It is fully equipped to handle almost every modern course in the computer field. The trade conducted under ITC is a one-year certificate course, Computer Operator and Processing Assistant (COPA).

Gymnasium

A gymnasium with state-of-the-art equipment is at the disposal of both staff and students.

Infirmary

Indisposed students can rest in the infirmary. Basic amenities such as First Aid are also provided.

Store

Textbooks, notebooks, science records and students' requisites can be had from the College Store.

Canteen

The Canteen provides vegetarian and non-vegetarian meals and snacks.

Transport

The College has a fleet of six buses that ply to all the major stops in the city. The fees for the college bus should be paid in two instalments (June & October). Buses will run on regular trips till the end of January. If the fees are paid as a lump sum at the beginning of the academic year, there will be a concession of Rs. 100/-. Apart from this, state and private bus services to the college are also available.

Hostel

It is meant only for students of this College. For application and other details, the Hostel Warden may be contacted.

Bank

The extension counter of the Central Bank of India functions in the college premises. It provides all the banking facilities for the staff and students.

Auditorium

The college has a new auditorium with a speaking capacity as 1800 people.

Language Lab

There is a language lab with around 40 computers with appropriate softwares.

Research Room

The research departments have well-equipped research rooms.

Conference Hall

There is an IT enabled large conference hall to hold conferences and meetings.

Audio Visual Room

The Audio Visual Room is fully equipped for academic and other purposes.

**INSTRUCTIONS REGARDING COLLEGE AND
PUBLIC EXAMINATIONS**

1. Students should be on time. Five minutes before the commencement of the examination, there will be a long bell at which all should enter the hall. At the second bell, the question papers will be distributed.
2. No books and notes should be taken into the examination hall and strict silence shall be observed.
3. No paper should be detached from the answer books. No paper with the College/University seal should be removed from the examination hall.
4. Ten minutes before the end of the examination, a warning bell will be rung after which no one should leave the hall. At the close of the examination, a long bell will be rung at which all will hand over their papers and leave the hall.
5. Students who finish early should leave the premises in silence.
6. No student will occupy any other chair than her own without the consent of the invigilator.
7. Parents and guardians should inform the Principal in time if their children or wards are unable to appear for an examination as absence from Terminal Examinations will be viewed seriously.
